SCANDALOUS CONDUCT-ELOPFMENTS AND AR-BASTS .-- Mr. DAVID DAWSON, a cabinet-maker, of Boonton, N. They did not return that night, and he les:ned from the stage driver that they had gone to Newsyk instead of their proposed destination. His suspicions were excited, and in the morning he followed in pursuit. In Newark be was informed that his wife and sister had gone to New-York the previous evening in company with two gentlemen, taking the children with them, and directing the baggage, which was still in Newark, to be forwarded next day. The ausband came on to New-York, procured the assistance of the Police, who immediately desided that the best way to find out the fugitives would be to watch the buggage, which was sent on according to utsettern. Shorey after its arrival the prisoners called for it, and while one was assisting in placing it on the cast the other paid the freight, and desired that it should be taken to the Globe Hotel, corner of Willism and Frangfort streets. At this stage of the procreatings the arrest was made, and the proceedings of fore Alderman BRAPT for Farcery instituted, this heirg the only complaint which the circumstances would austain at that time. To day Mir. Maxa will prefer a charge of a duction against the men, in ad-dition to that of farcery. The women and children were found at the Globe Hotel. FOUND DEAD ON THE HUDSON RIVER ROAD.-An inquest was held yesterday at Manhattanville by Coroner JACKMAN upon the remains of a German named Nicholas Ednn, 31 years of age, who was found tead near the track of the Hudson River Railroad, about 7 o'clock on Saturday evening. Louis REIBLE testified that on Thursday evening deceased and himself were returning from Niagara Falls, via the Hudson River Railroad, and when near Manhatianville he suddenly missed his friend. Mr. REIBLE also stated that he had the train stopped, and a search for the missing man was made, but without success. Decensed was not intexicated, but seemed a few mo-Decessed was not interfaced, but seemed a lew mo-ments tefore his disappearance to be in an unsettled slate cf mind. The body was found near Fort Wash-ingter, lying face downwards, in a pool of blood, but there were no marks of violence about it except a small scratch on the face. The watch and money of decessed were found on the remains, and the pre-sumption is that the unfortunate man either jumped or fell of the cars while in motion, and had been killed by the fall. A versict in accordance with the above facts was rendered. The body was handed over to the friends for interment. the friends for interment.

SUICIDE WHILE INSANE .--- Mr. NOBLE G. MINOR, of No. 128 Cameron-street, committed self-destruction yesterday morning by cutting his throat with a razor. Coroner JACKMAN held an inquest, and the evidence showed that deceased for some time past had been subject to periods of temporary insanity, in one of which he performed the fatal act. A daughter of acceased was in the room a few minutes before, when, observing her father's condition, and anticipating trouble, she left for assistance. On her return deceased was found standing before a mirror in the act of rutting an end to his life. Mrs. MINOR was at church when the sad affair occurred, and knew nothing of it until she reached home. Mr. MINOR is notating of it until she reached nome. Air, AliNoE is said to have been a man of considerable property, end was much respected by his neighbors. No cause but that of temporary instantiy is given for the com-mission of the melancholy deed, and a verdict of "Suicide while laboring under an attack of tempor-ary instanty" was rendered.

LAUNCH OF A NEW STEAMER.-About 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon Mr. SAMUEL SNEEDEN launched from his ship-yard at Greenpoint a screw-steamship called the Richard R. Cuyler, owned by the American Atlantic Steamship Company Line, to be run between here and Savannah. The following are her dimensions : Length on deck, 245 feet ; breadth of beam, 42 feet ; depth of hold, 25 feet, and 1,800 tons. She will have two direct acting steam-hammer engines, of 70inch cylinder and four-foot stroke : also, two tubular bollets, which, with the engines, will be placed amid-ships. Her propeller is four-bladed, and of cast iron, supported by a wrought iron post. FOR EUROPE.—The British screw steamer City of Manchester, Capt. R. HENDERSON, NO. 152 West Thirtieth-street. The lad's hands and feet were shockingly burned—the fingers and toes having been entirely consumed by the intense heat. The jury, in their verdict, censured the proprietor of the factory for the intecure condition of the area. THE WEEKLY REPORT OF THE NEW-YORK HOS-"HTAL,-The report of the Superintendent of the New-York Hospital, for the week ending Aug. 19, shows that on the 12th of August there were in the Hospital 399 surgical cases and 72 for medical treatment ; there had been admitted, Aug. 10, 33 surgical and 20 medicsi cases; discharged cured or relieved 20 surgi-cal and 20 medical patients; died, 3 surgical and 3 medical patients. The number remaining at date was 100 surgical and 73 medical patients—in all 272, of which obly we makes and 51 females. which 221 were males and 51 females. EXCURSIONS TO FLUSHING .--- The steamer Enoch Dean has been purchased by a company recently organized among the citizens of Flushing, and, with a new steamboat soon to be put under contract, will constitute a line between this City and Flushing. The new boat is to be of light draft, built and finished in mocern style, and calculated to "travel" with any steamer of her size upon the river. The Dean now makes several trips from Fulton Market daily, carry-ivg parties or individuals upon excursions at a reduction from the regular fare. He had a watch in his pocket. The body is much decomposed. FATAL VEHICLE ACCIDENT.-THOMAS FARRELL, who was run over by a horse and wagon, last Friday, in Breadway, near Fifty-second-street, died vesterday from his injuries. Coroner Schurmen held an inquest at the late residence of deceased, in Seventh-avenue, when a verdict of "Death from injuries acceived by being run over by a vehicle, to the jury pukrowa," was rendered. Deceased was 15 years of age. SHOCKING ACCIDENT ON THE HUDSON RIVER RAILBOAD .- MICHABL LOGAN, employed by the Hudson River Railroad Company, while coming to the City on the 3 o'clock train, Friday, in an intoxicated condition, fell off the cars and was shockingly mutilated. Ilis right arm was cut off, and his body cut in various places. Officers Hows and SMITH, on his arrival in the City, conveyed him to the Hospital, where his recovery is not expected.
