On Saturday morning last, a man was found upon the track of the railway at Mansfield, Mass., entirely dead. He appeared to have been killed by the steamboat train of the last evening. from Boston to Providence. The right arm was severed from the body above the elbow, and the skull was also wounded severely. He was five feet soven inches high, and pricked upon his right arm in India ink, were the initials "M. J. S., 1821 " His pocket book contained seventy-one cents in change, and a hill of goods amounting to \$65, headed "Thomas Wilson to Mr. J. Farr." His baggage check to New York was also found upon him. One joint from the middle finger of his right hand had been formerly lost.

formerly lost. A fire broke out on Saturday, in the warehouse of Wm. McGregor, at Bolivia, O. The building—the largest warehouse on the canal—was consumed, together with its contents, including a large dry goods store and a quantity of whoat; loss estimated at \$7,000. The flames spread to the adjoining warehouse of J. Y. Smith, and swept it together with its contents, including a stock of goods and 2,000 bushels of wheat; loss estimated \$2,000—insured \$3,200. The wheat was sold the day before to a wheat buyor, to be shipped in a few days. A nice legal question is likely to arise as to which party shall suffer the loss. The fire is supposed to have originated in the I O. of O. F. Lodge-room, in the third story of the large warchouse.

Last Saturday night, as the Skiddy was going up the river, and a short distance above Coeymans, she ran into some barges towed by the Baltic, but her appearance the next morning indicated that she had rather the worst of the encounter. Every stanchion under the guard, on the laboard side, from the bow to the wheel, was taken off as if by a knife. A part of the wheel, house was carried away, and a hole stove in her side. It is believed that a man missing was knocked off one of the boats and was drowned. The damage to the Skiddy was speedily repaired.

The Commissioners appointed to select a site for the new Custom House at Richmond, Va., have agreed to pay \$50,000 for a lot on Main-street, belonging to Mrs. Wickham, situated immediately opposite the Farmers' and Virginia Banking Houses. It fronts one hundred and forty feet on Main-street, extends through to Bank-street, having a depth of one hundred and sixty feet, and fronts a like number of feet on that street.

An interesting little girl, ten years of age, in Nashua, N. H., was so badly frightened recently, by a man disguised in a mask, at a window she was pissing, that an affection of the brain ensued, of which she died.

Julius Powell, a lad about soven years of age, son of the proprietor of an axe factory in Ohio City, fell into a steam box containing boiling water, on Friday evening last, and was so badly scalded that he died on the following morning.
