#### Railroad Accident.

As the mail train from l'hiladelphia was near the Hackensack River, last evening, at a little after 9 o'clock, the pilot upon the locomotive struck a man whose name is unknown, threw him off the track and instantly killed him. He was waiking upon the track. The whistle was blown, and the breaks applied, but without avail. He is a man of small stature, apparently 35 years of age, had auburn hair, a sandy goatee, wore a black coat, white shirt, black silk cravat, blue satin vest, drab pants and black gaiters. He was apparently a boatman. The initials "J.M." were marked upon one of his hands in India Ink.
